An Advanced Orthotics and Prosthetics Program


Shriners Hospitals for Children has a long history of providing expertly crafted, correctly fitting orthotic and prosthetic (O&P) devices to children who need them, giving kids with missing limbs and other orthopaedic difficulties the opportunity to believe in their dreams and be active participants in the world around them.

Our staff members have created devices that allow children with missing limbs to play musical instruments, participate in sports and to have a better quality of life. Our highly trained O&P professionals can create a full range of devices, from a complete prosthetic limb to the smallest assistive device, for children of all ages, as efficiently, accurately and precisely as possible.

A FASTER, SMARTER WAY TO CREATE O&P DEVICES

Shriners Hospitals for Children has taken its commitment to children in need of O&P devices even further, and established a system-wide approach that is more streamlined, collaborative and technologically advanced.

The U.S. Shriners Hospitals have been divided into six regions, each with a hospital designated as a regional





fabrication center that supports the O&P departments of specific Shriners Hospitals. The O&P departments and regional fabrication centers are separate nonprofit LLC corporations, known as Pediatric Orthotic and Prosthetic Services (POPS).

The fabrication centers have electronic carvers, and each hospital location has computer-assisted design (CAD) capabilities.

In the new process, hospital staff use a light scanner to scan the patient's leg, for example, to obtain measurements and other information. Using CAD, the practitioner creates a rendition of the device needed. The computerized data is then sent to the regional fabrication center for development of a foam model using the electronic carver. Then, the actual device is created and sent to the requesting hospital, where it is fitted to the patient, and the patient is taught to use the new device.

This approach eliminates the need for creating plaster casts as models, and saves the scanned model as a digital file for future reference. Now, creating an O&P device can be accomplished in days, rather than weeks. The computerized data also helps document changes in patients' growth or weight, which may necessitate new devices.

In addition, our Salt Lake City location has a foot carver machine that is specifically used to create orthotics that



are inserted into shoes to correct a range of foot-related problems, such as a lack of or too much of an arch. This machine can create the entire device without a foam model. The Salt Lake City POPS department will provide this type of orthosis for the entire health care system.

MAKING TECHNOLOGY MORE ACCESSIBLE

Future plans for O&P include the development of a pilot program for 3-D printing for sockets, including determining the durability and quality of a printed socket. The socket is the part of a prosthetic device that fits around the residual limb. Its fit and construction are critical to the success of the device for the patient.

"The POPS program strengthens the consistency and efficiency of our processes and products throughout our health care system," said JoAnne Kanas, corporate director of O&P Services. "It is also a differentiator for Shriners Hospitals; very few hospitals still have their own O&P departments or programs."

The policies of Shriners Hospitals for Children are replicated in each POPS location, including the commitment to provide each patient with the best possible individualized care, regardless of the family's ability to pay.

"Shriners Hospitals is unique in its approach to O&P," said Kanas. "What we can do for our patients is special."

Teamwork: Together Everyone Achieves More

Scott Kozin, M.D., chief of staff of Shriners Hospitals for Children[®] — Philadelphia, loves to tell the story of two, four, six, eight.

At 2 years old, Zion developed a serious infection that required his hands and feet to be amputated. At 4 years old, he received a kidney transplant; the donor was his mother, Pattie. Zion was taking antirejection drugs to keep his new kidney functioning. At age 6, Zion came to Shriners Hospitals for Children — Philadelphia for new prosthetic legs.

The evaluation of Zion's lower extremities prior to his receiving those first prosthetics from Shriners Hospitals was the impetus that led to his hand transplantation. The idea to give Zion hands was possible because he met the prerequisite of already being a transplant recipient and successfully taking immunosuppressant medications.

History-Making Surgery

At 8 years old, Zion received the first bilateral pediatric hand transplantation at the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia along with help from Penn Medicine, Gift of Life and hand surgeons from our Philadelphia hospital, Dr. Kozin and Dan Zlotolow, M.D. During the 11-hour procedure, four teams of physicians worked to transplant the hands from the donor to Zion. The procedure required boney fixation, artery and venous anastomosis along with nerve and tendon reconstruction. The surgery was successful.

"The collaboration between these institutions was necessary to assemble the team and organize the players to orchestrate such a complex and demanding procedure that had never been performed on a child," said Dr. Kozin.

Becoming Independent

Zion is now three years post-hand transplant surgery.

Now 11 years old, he is a happy pre-teen and learning to be independent. He enjoys cooking and sports. "Zion is so comfortable living his normal life," said Pattie. "He enjoys playing laser tag with his friends, boxing, and is attending robotics camp this summer."

Zion continues to have occupational and physical therapy in his hometown. His mom couldn't be more happy with his progress. As Zion continues to grow and get taller, Pattie will bring him back to the Philadelphia Shriners Hospitals for Children



to be fitted for a new set of prosthetic legs. In the meantime, she is delighted that Zion is becoming more independent every day at home, at play, and at school.

Scott Kozin, M.D., is the chief of staff of Shriners Hospitals for Children — Philadelphia and is board certified by the American Board of Orthopaedic Surgery. Today, the majority of our locations provide care for children with all types of orthopaedic conditions, including clubfoot, hip disorders, limb deficiencies and deformities, scoliosis, and orthopaedic difficulties related to cerebral palsy and other neuromuscular conditions.

Aware of a need for medical expertise in pediatric burn care, we opened three hospitals specializing in acute and rehabilitative burn care in the mid-1960s. These are the only hospitals that were initially established exclusively for the treatment of pediatric burns and related conditions. A fourth hospital in our health care system offers treatment in all four of our care disciplines, including burns. These hospitals continue to be pioneers in pediatric burn treatment and research and are recognized as leaders in the development of improved and innovative treatment techniques.

In the early 1980s, our organization began the nation's first pediatric spinal cord injury rehabilitation programs. These initiatives offer patients a complete range of services that help promote recovery to the fullest extent possible.

Cleft lip and palate is the health care system's fourth service line. Facial clefts are one of the most common birth defects in the U.S. Despite the frequency of its occurrence, and the severity of the deformities, comprehensive care for patients with cleft lip and palate can be difficult to obtain. Shriners Hospitals for Children is committed to improving care for children with this condition through a coordinated program of clinical excellence, teaching and research.

Groundbreaking Research and Discoveries

Shriners Hospitals for Children strives to discover answers that will one day improve lives by conducting high-quality, innovative research, especially in the areas of burns, orthopaedic/musculoskeletal and neurological injury and disease.

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
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
